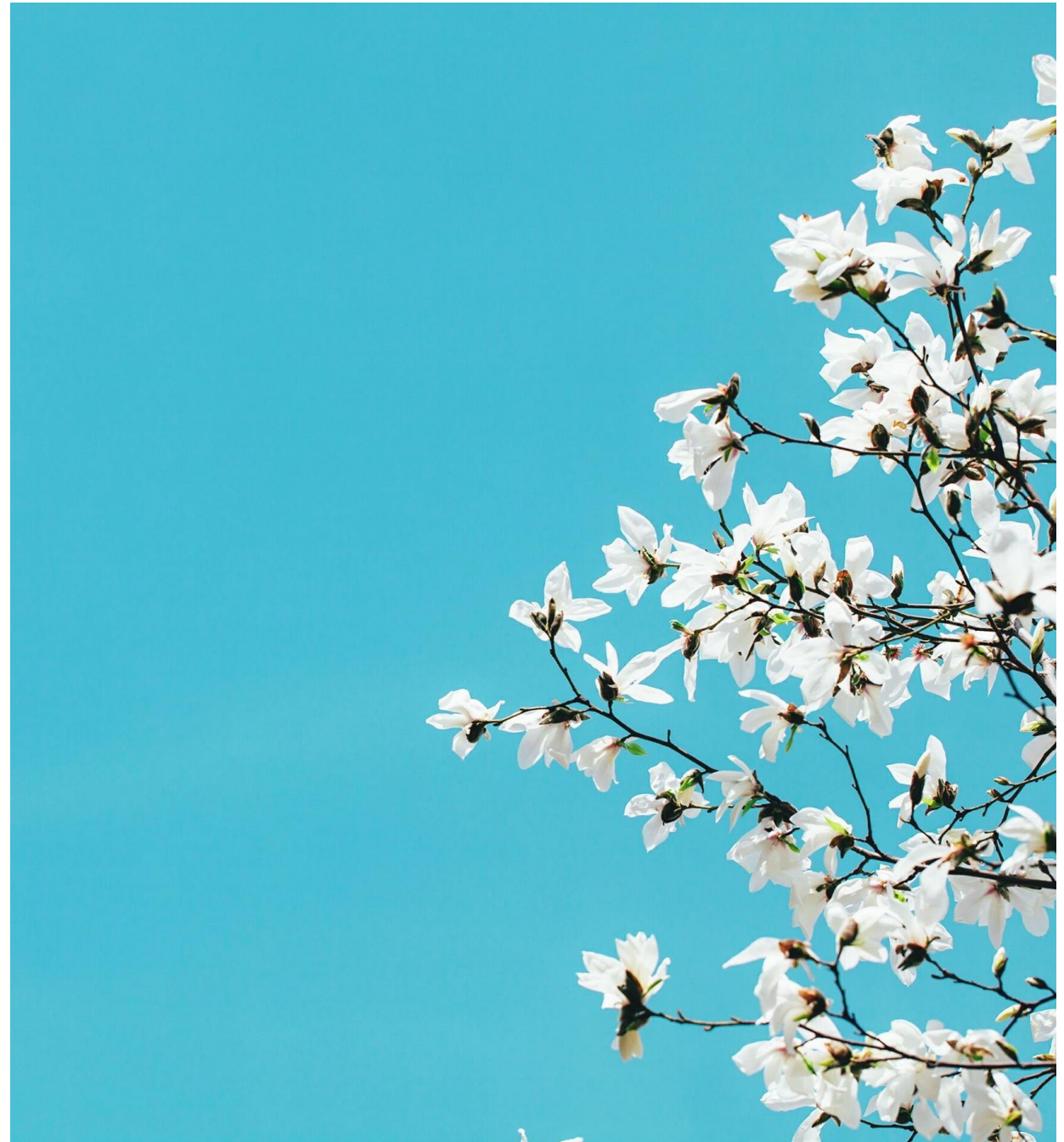

Jackson County Jail Programs

A Collaborative Approach to Enhancing Opportunity for
Criminal Justice Involved Individuals

“In the midst of every crisis lies great opportunity” – Albert Einstein

- Jail Overcrowding issues have been a long-time issue in our county
 - Unpredictable Release Times make coordination difficult
- Rehabilitative Programs essentially completely eliminated during pandemic
- Opioid epidemic creates weekly medical emergencies within facility

Partnerships Build Foundation Jail Release Resource Program (JRRP)

- Years of collaboration and planning result in Community Justice implementation of JRRP.
- Goal of equipping AIC with the resources and support they need to succeed in the community.
- Jail-imbedded Community Justice Officers devoted to identifying need and coordinating release plans as individuals release from jail.

Jail Release Resource Program (JRRP)

- Community Justice Officers stationed at Jail
- Corrections Deputy fully committed to JRRP work
- Conduct needs assessments
- Provide Referrals if appropriate
 - Treatment
 - Basic Needs
- Data collection built into program

Peer Support Strengthens Relationships



Peer Support

- Intentionally provided access to a variety of organizations
- Peers have the ability to meet one-on-one, or in small groups
 - Discussions are very wide-ranging and open to peer discretion
- Continued expansion for peer driven services
 - Job Training, GED, Cognitive Behavioral Tools, Treatment Circles.....

****Unintended Consequence = Jail Staff and Peer Relationship Development**

Add in some Medication



-
- Partnership with Medford Treatment Center establishes options for starting Medication while in-custody
 - Medication proven to reduce overdose risk upon release
 - Medical Staff discusses options with client and offers MAT/MOUD choices
 - Buprenorphine and Methadone
 - Upon Release from jail, clients are established patients of MTC

Funding and Support

- Initial, and on-going investment from Justice Reinvestment Program for JRRP salaries and contracts
- Contribution of Opioid Settlement Funds from Jackson County Health and Human Services
 - Initially funded dedicated Deputy, additional CJO, and peer/service contracts.
- Awarded Jail MOUD Grant from CJC. This freed majority of Opioid Settlement Funds for other projects
- Program development with potential Medicaid Waiver Implementation in mind

Long-Term Considerations

- Permanent Funding Solutions
 - Medicaid 1115 Waiver
- Need/Demand vs. Resources
 - Continued evaluation of capacity (currently more interest than opportunity)
- Jail Space and Design
 - Insufficient programming space
 - Management of security concerns related to medications

- Reduce/eliminate illicit opioid use at the jail

- Prevent return to use
- Prevent opioid overdoses after release

MTC Medical Services Provided

Medical assessment including history and physical*

Assessment for physical signs and symptoms *

Induction *

Monitoring for adequate dose*

Ongoing physical assessment*

Referrals if needed

Wound care

MTC Counseling Services Provided

Individual counseling to develop a person-centered plan of care

Education about substance use disorders*

Group counseling and education

Case Management*

Referrals for higher level of care if needed
(residential care, mental health services)
