



Not Just Bandaids and Ice




Acute illness and injury- Not just bandaids and ice.

2 Models of health care:

- A. Provider Model
- § 10 hours of **in school** provider per week.
- § Primary care provider
- § Nurse care in person is 3-5 days a week
- § Well Child Visits
- **§** Sports Physicals





B. Non-Provider Model

- No provider time at the school
- Nurse usually in person 2 days a week

Use of Telehealth cart for provider support

Parents join in person or virtual through link Part of a Pilot Project

Proven to be very helpful for remote schools and underserved populations

Engagement evidenced by written consent Sams Valley Elementary 49% of population Patrick Elementary 37% of population Central Point Elementary 30% of population

Mental Health Behavioral Health Clinicians (BHC)

Our team of over 30 mental health therapists provide services at health centers in 19 schools.

We provide services to children and adolescents from elementary to high school age.




Our team provides regular individual, group, and/or family therapy to our clients to address a variety of presenting concerns, including, but not limited to:

- Depression
- Anxiety
- Trauma
- Substance Use
- Parental Divorce/Separation
- Emotional Dysregulation

Engaging in Services



Behavioral Health Support Specialist (BHSS)

What We Do

- Work directly with students, one-on-one or in small groups
- Reinforce therapeutic goals through practice and coaching
- Partner with therapists, teachers, and families

Focus Areas

- Emotional regulation
- Coping strategies
- Social skills and communication
- Conflict resolution
- Self-esteem and resilience







Individual Services

How do students access BHSS services?

- Student must have an active treatment plan with a therapist
- Skills training is added as extra support
- Therapists typically refer, but staff can suggest and coordinate with SBHC team

Where it Happens

- On-campus, during the school day
- Sessions are flexible and adapted to individual student needs



Group Services: Providing Broader Access

Why groups?

- Groups provide support for students who may not need or qualify for therapy
- Helps reach students in schools without a licensed therapist
- Broadens access to skill-building opportunities

Flexible Format:

- Topics and structure are adapted to meet the group's needs
- Typically 3–5 students per group
- Usually 4–8 sessions
- Activities are interactive: social games, discussion, drawing, and role-play




Common Focus Areas:

- Friendship & social skills
- Conflict resolution
- Managing anxiety
- Emotional awareness

Why Skills Training Matters

Our Impact:

- BHSSs have flexibility to see students in various settings, giving therapists additional insight outside the office.
- We reinforce goals being worked on in therapy and help students apply them in context—whether it's in the classroom, hallway, or playground.
- This layered support often reduces behavioral challenges, boosts engagement, serves as a steppingstone for students that might eventually benefit from therapy services.
- Provides broader access to mental health services.




Behavioral Health Support Specialist (BHSS), CADC, QMHA

We piloted this support last school year, with 1 BHSS/CADC at 3 high schools.

This school year we now have 2 BHSS/CADC's and we are providing brief intervention and supports at 7 schools across Jackson County. (3 middle schools and 4 high schools)

















What we do

We provide a variety of services designed to support youth and the community such as:

- Substance Use Brief Interventions
- Referral to youth serving treatment agencies
- SDOH Screening & Referrals
- Behavioral Health Screenings
- Community Education
- Group Support
- Youth Resource Connections
- Alternative to out of School Suspension

Age 12-17	12.5% (~38,000 youth)	9 %
Age 18-25	36% (~148,000 youth)	27%

Youth who are classified as needing substance use treatment who did not receive treatment (measure of unmet need)

Age 12-17	Sampling Issue: Unknown*
Age 18-25	83% (~135,000 youth)

Why brief intervention matters

- For people 12 –17, previous analysis and research suggests that this number is in line or higher than ages 18-25.
- Source: 2022 National Survey of Drug Use and Health State Data Tables and Reports from the 2021-2022 NSDUH (tables 22 and 30)

Impact of Brief Intervention: Data Overview

School Year 23/24: We reached **93** students

School Year 24/25: We have reached **129** students with a total of **294** care steps.








Supporting Students & Families Through School-Based Health Centers



- Rogue Community Health is a Federally Qualified, non-profit health center.
- We provide affordable, high-quality care to nearly 15,000 Southern Oregon residents.
- We have Medical, Dental, and Behavioral Health locations in Ashland, Medford, Eagle Point, White City, and Butte Falls.



School-Based Health Centers (SBHC)



- An SBHC is a health clinic located within a school.
- We serve over 4000 students regardless of insurance or ability to pay.
- We offer primary care and behavioral health at four SBHCs.

How Students Access Services

- Services are available Monday—
 Friday during the school year.
- We serve students and their siblings.
- Signed consent forms are required (unless the student is of consenting age).



Strong partnerships with District 9 schools are key to connecting students to the care and services they need.

We show up at events where our families are so they can meet our team and ask questions.



Migrant Families

We help migrant families catch up with immunizations and translate immunization records from Mexico.





A single mom found after-school care with help from our YRN and was able to afford it through financial assistance.


A student starting adult life got help applying for housing and searching for work.

SCHOOLS REFERRING TO YRN FOR SDOH








How do Students Connect with the YRN?

- YRN is on-site at URCEO and EPHS one day each week.
- YRN info is shared via SBHC staff, school newsletters, rack cards, and staff meetings.
- We support school events.
- All referrals made by school staff or students require informed consent.

Mobile Dental Clinic for School Districts 9, 59, and 91

Sealant Clinic



October through February

- An oral assessment
- The first fluoride varnish application

Fluoride Clinic



October through June

Students receive a second fluoride varnish three months after the first, which is especially important for the high-risk population we serve.

Dental Education



October through June
Dental education clinics run
the length of the school year.



Positive Impacts on Dental Health

Children who receive a dental sealant are 80% less likely to experience tooth decay.

- Oral health is an essential part of total health.
- Early identification of problems helps avoid more serious and costly treatment.
- When we identify a need for additional care, we follow up with parents and, when appropriate, help families find a dental home.



How We Connect with Students



- Our Dental Prevention Team handdelivers consent packets in English and Spanish to each school office.
- To participate, families must return our consent forms.
- A new digital consent form option for the 2024–2025 school year helped increase participation at some schools!
